Answer 1: A

There are relative pronouns and adverbs used in writing. There are five relative pronouns, who, whose, whom, which, and that. "Who" is a subject pronoun like "he," "she" and "we" use "who" to ask which person does an action or which person is a certain way. (ie: Who is in the bathroom?) "Whom" is an object pronoun like "him," "her" and "us" use "whom" to ask which person receives an action. (ie: Whom are you going to take?) "Whose" is a possessive pronoun like "his," "her" and "our" use "whose" to find out which person something belongs to. (ie: Whose book is this?) When the relative pronoun is the object of a preposition, which is used instead of that, for example, "in which," "for which," "about which," "through which," etc. There are also three relative adverbs. Where is used for place, when for time, and why for reasoning.
