Persuasive writing convinces someone to do, think or believe something. Persuasive writing also often organizes ideas using a compare/contrast or cause/effect structure. For instance, an essay trying to persuade people to recycle might compare and contrast a future with or without recycling; or might show the effect of failing to recycle.
